Welcome to the November and December edition of the Global Learning and Engagement (GL&E) newsletter.

This year, over 2,000 local students have participated in the department's GL&E programs and in doing so, connected with over 150 schools globally. The findings of a recent independent review of these programs found they acted as catalysts for a more globally engaged and collaborative student body, enhancing the educational experience for both local and international students.

Among highlights are the five Victorian government schools involved in the 2023 Connecting Schools with Indian Communities program. The schools were provided funding of up to \$25,000 to develop local partnerships and activities to strengthen engagement with local Indian diaspora. I'm delighted to share that schools have reported that their respective activities contributed to meaningful connections with the Indian community and assisted students to enhance their global citizenship and intercultural skills. You can find more details on the funded activities later in this newsletter.

The department is receiving an increased volume in requests from visiting delegations from overseas education jurisdictions to learn about and observe the work you are doing in schools. Recent visits have been made by Indian school leaders and representatives from the Jiangsu Provincial Department of Education in China. Visting delegations provide a great opportunity to showcase the Victorian education system, forge people-to-people links and cultural ties through knowledge sharing, and most importantly, celebrate that excellent work being done in government schools. Geelong Tech School: Global Design Challenge program 2023

Geelong Tech School delivered the department's Global Design Challenge in Term 3 and Term 4, 2023. The program was offered through Geelong Tech School's Knox Innovation Opportunity and Sustainability Centre to 96 Victorian students and 100 international students and was based on their highly successful program, Design for Humanity. The 6-week challenge provided an opportunity for local secondary students to collaborate with Hong Kong International School in Term 3 and The Grammar School Nicosia in Cyprus in Term 4 to create customised solutions to real world problems and community needs in difficult environments.

Participating students analysed case studies provided by industry partner Field Ready, around water scarcity, sanitation and hygiene, shelter, nutrition and health issues. Students used CAD software, Fusion 360 and 3D printers to protype their cost-effective solutions to meet community needs. Model United Nations Conference 2023 program update

This year 243 Victorian secondary school students participated in simulated United Nations (UN) General Assembly debates as part of the department's Model UN Conference program, partnering with schools in China, Indonesia, Vietnam and Taiwan. The conferences were conducted in hybrid model and focused on the UN Development Goals (UNSDG), with Zero Hunger (UNSDG 2), Quality Education for All (UNSDG 4), Gender Equality (UNSDG 5), and Climate Action (UNSDG 13).



Connecting Schools with Indian Communities 2023: School projects

The department's Connecting Schools with Indian Communities (CSIC) program 2023 supports the Victorian Government's 10-year strategy to strengthen Victoria's ties with India; Victoria's India Strategy: Our Shared Future. The program provides guidance and funding to schools to build activities and initiatives that support collaborative partnerships between schools, the Indian diaspora and the broader community. Funded schools have designed a community art gallery, introduced dance programs, established music education and mentoring programs, produced a Bollywood-genre film, and hosted a whole-school Yoga day, cultural excursions and an Indian night market.

Globally Engaged Learners: 2023 program highlights

In 2023, over 1100 Victorian students participated in the department's Globally Engaged Learners (GELs) program and connected with international students in Indonesia, China, India and Malaysia. The program equipped students with the skills and tools to collaborate effectively with international peers, understand cultural differences and inequalities and tackle locally relevant issues in a virtual environment. Below are highlights from the activities delivered as part of GELs this year:

- Global UP Teen Global Competence Certificate, consisted of 19 self-paced modules and 4 facilitated online sessions and covered topics such as metaphors of culture, stereotypes, suspending judgement, coping and being resilient, microaggressions and more.
- Connect Global Youth Forums, encouraged students to explore the UNSDGs and devise action plans.
- **Culture Quest**, a combination of 3D gaming, virtual reality, augmented reality and 360 Video where students immersed themselves in challenges set on the Great Wall of China.
- The UN Environmental Challenge and Earthshot Prize Pitch, where both Victorian and international students gained a valuable understanding of how their actions are perceived by individuals from different cultures through collaborative problem-solving activities based on global environmental challenges.
- Global Citizenship Student Ambassador, where young changemakers identified and tackled issues of concern to them. Students
 connected with community, educated others about their issue, undertook project planning and management and designed
 digital technology solutions to amplify their project impact and enact change.

The program will be delivered in Term 3, 2024 by Beijing Language and Culture University (BLCU) and Meg Languages.
